### Vienna's Own Olympic-Hopeful Veronica Day Starts Strong in Skeleton Season

From a recent USA Bobsled and Skeleton Press Release:

**CALGARY, CANADA** (Nov. 13, 2015)- American **Veronica Day** (Vienna, Va.) won bronze medals in the first two women's skeleton North American Cup races at the Canada Olympic Park in Calgary ....

"The entire week of sliding was definitely a struggle," Day said. "We

arrived very late in Calgary and we had to be up early the following morning for the start of official training. The ice was really slow for the first two days. ... In the end, I'm happy with my results, but it certainly left me wanting more."

Our Optimist Club provides financial support to Veronica to help her reach her Olympic goal. She has been the guest speaker at our Helping Hands Awards and is scheduled to speak at our Youth of Excellence Awards in 2016.
