

May Board Meeting Highlights

The Board of Directors met on May 11 with 12 members present. Highlights of the meeting are as follows:

- VP of Youth Mike Fitzella complimented Laurie Cole for the successful Helping Hands program and reported that the Partners in Education program scheduled for our June 1 meeting will recognize teachers in the areas of fine/performing arts at Madison, Marshall and Oakton High Schools.
- Approved the award of a \$1,000 vocational scholarship to young man from Oakton High School to attend the Learning into Future Environments (LIFE) program at George Mason University. The LIFE program is a creative postsecondary program for young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Students enrolled in the LIFE program take classes to improve their literacy, employment skills, and independent living skills. At the same time, the program provides apprenticeships in human services fields such as assistive technology, education, and psychology.
- Susan Bauer noted that planning for Family Fun Day for Growing Hope is underway and the Respect for Law program is scheduled for July 20.

- Reviewed thank you notes from a T.R. Cook Youth of Excellence Award winner from Madison High School, the Committee for Helping Others (CHO) and for our donation for the Paul VI School All-Night Graduation Celebration.
- Approved a donation to the Cedar Lane School to support awards and field trips.
