### **Board Meeting Highlights February 2018**

The Board of Directors of the Optimist Club of Greater Vienna met on February 15, 2018, with seven members present (plus two proxies from absent members). Highlights of the meeting include:

- Treasurer Tom Bauer noting that members are not consistently signing in at meetings and recording guests attending. This makes accounting for meal costs more difficult;
- Approving payments of: \$294 to OI for new Wolftrap ES JOI dues (unbudgeted); \$350 for Babe Ruth team sponsorship;
  \$100 prize sponsorship to JMHS All Night Grad party (in addition to usual donation);
- Farmers Market Committee reporting it held an open meeting for the neighbors at the new Community Center location (1 neighbor attended), and that other logistics are moving forward;
- VP Finance Dick Lippert confirming that credit card transactions will be tested at Growing Hope day, and that Christmas tree supplier has been contacted regarding the quality of this years trees with the goal that next year's supply will be better;
- VP Membership Kathy Cutri presenting plans for the March NOW/Social meeting at the Vienna Arts Society.
